How to make a quiz using Kahoot:

- 1. Go to Google Chrome web browser
- 2. Type: getkahoot.com
- 3. Create a free account or log in
- 4. Click on "New K!" in upper left hand corner
- 5. Click on Quiz
 - a. Name quiz, press Go
 - 6. Type each question (95 characters or less)
 - a. Type between 2-4 answer choices (60 characters or less)
 - b. Press the minus sign to delete answer choice
 - c. Choose the one correct answer

7. Click +Add Question

8. Type remaining questions

To add images: (this step is not necessary)

- 1. Lower left hand corner, click Question 1
- 2. In a new tab, find and save an image
- 3. On the Kahoot question, click "Choose File" and insert saved image
- 4. Repeat for each question

To add video:

- 1. Go to question that will have video
- 2. In a new tab, find YouTube video
- 3. Click the Share icon
- 4. Copy URL
- 5. On Kahoot tab, click on VIDEO tab below the Question number
 - a. Paste URL of YouTube video in ID box

b. Change "End at" time for length of video you want it to run



Final Steps:

- 1. Save & Continue
- 2. Re-order questions, if necessary
- 3. Save & Continue
- 4. Change Privacy settings (private) and audience (school)
 - a. You may choose to add description and tags if you like
- 5. Save & Continue
- 6. Add an image to the cover if you like
- 7. Done

It is recommended to preview quiz before using with your students.

FYI: What is the difference between the Discussion, Survey and Quiz modes?

The Quiz is the most commonly used format, it includes timed responses and a points system creating a competitive atmosphere.

The survey is similar but does not use points. This means it can be used for feedback or finding out what a class knows without the competition.

A Discussion is a single question, without the competitive elements. This can be used to ignite discussion, at the beginning of a session. For example, you could ask a question such as 'Who do you think is a better team, the Chicago Bears or the Green Bay Packers?'. The responses will then appear at the front, which could ignite debate.
